Τ	Thereupon, the following proceedings were had:
2	
3	FANNY LIVINGSTON
4	MS. LIVINGSTON: I feel very strongly
5	about that because this is one of the things in going to
6	some of the meetings, I thought, well, you know, that
7	Constitution is a good Constitution, but we do need to
8	have maybe some amendments put in there in various areas.
9	But I think that the Council should have some
10	rules of order and some standing rules. As far as I can
11	remember back, I think standing rules more or less kind
12	of set up, you know, sort of the things that you follow,
13	like in your agenda or something like that, how it's
14	controlled.
15	And also, I think that each it would tell
16	more in detail what the governing body is responsible
17	for. Because in this last time, too many people have
18	overstepped their boundary lines. And that would keep
19	them within their boundaries. They can go back and say,
20	"Well, you know, this is what your responsibility is, so
21	you stay within that area and leave the rest, you know,
22	for us to do." I mean, establish some guidelines as to
23	where the cut-off is.
24	And then with the Council people, in regards

25 to, you know, the things that come up that need changed,

1 well, they can go to their standing rules or whatever it

- 2 is that they've established, and say, "Well, in this
- 3 particular area we're having a problem here, and I feel
- 4 like that there should be some changes made and let's
- 5 discuss it and maybe make a new -- either make an
- 6 amendment or establish a new rule here."
- 7 That will help us to govern more properly.
- 8 Does that pretty much take in what I've been saying, or
- 9 not?
- 10 MR. KEEN: I think so, ma'am. Let me
- 11 ask you a question. Article 5, which is the Article that
- 12 creates Legislative branch, Section 2 --
- MS. LIVINGSTON: I know it's listed
- 14 there in the Constitution, but I think sometimes that
- 15 those things should be expounded on, you know, maybe a
- 16 little bit.
- 17 MR. KEEN: Well, it says, "The
- 18 Council shall establish its rules for its dimension's
- 19 decorum and procedure." Are you telling us today that
- 20 maybe that language should be expanded upon?
- MS. LIVINGSTON: I think so.
- 22 Because, I mean, I haven't read my Constitution lately,
- 23 but, you know, sometimes you can come out and explain it
- 24 a little more clearly.
- 25 Like some of the people were saying, well, you

1 know, they didn't understand some of these sections in

- 2 here and all. If they have some rules that explain it a
- 3 little more clearly, then the members can read it and
- 4 understand it better, maybe.
- 5 MR. KEEN: There's been some other
- 6 suggestions at previous hearings about different parts,
- 7 the different language that is in our Constitution that
- 8 is perhaps obsolete and should be removed. Is there any
- 9 part of this that you say -- you just made reference to
- 10 not understanding. Is there any particular area that you
- 11 feel should be changed?
- MS. LIVINGSTON: Well, no, not
- 13 really. But some people may find it hard to understand.
- 14 And on top of that, I think that you should have it
- 15 published. Do you have it published in the Cherokee
- 16 language? Because there are some of our Cherokee people
- 17 who still read in their own language and understand it
- 18 better in their own language. And that's one thing that
- 19 I think that we should consider too.
- MR. HANNAH: We discussed earlier
- 21 that we have received a copy of the Constitution of the
- 22 Eastern band of Cherokee, and it is presented in both
- 23 English and in Cherokee.
- 24 Personal observation is that that is an
- 25 outstanding point of respect for the language of the

1 culture. We're also reminded legally that we must be

- 2 about presentation of our Constitution in a form that can
- 3 be interpreted in legal courts in the future. But
- 4 certainly the cultural aspect would be an interesting
- 5 addition for us.
- 6 MS. LIVINGSTON: I think it's been
- 7 very unfair to them that you haven't done this for them.
- 8 MR. WICKLIFFE: I think we can make a
- 9 comment here. We have the ability to, with our
- 10 interpreter that we have, to do that. To write, you
- 11 know, address it in Cherokee language much similar to
- 12 what they've done in North Carolina. And that's a good
- 13 point.
- 14 And I think, too, probably what you're saying
- 15 is, we need to adopt rules for the conduct of our
- 16 meetings, beyond saying that the Robert's Rules of Order
- 17 is the parliamentary procedure we're going to use. I
- 18 think that setting down rules by the Council, I really
- 19 truly don't believe it's been done.
- 20 I think that might be what we need to address
- 21 in the amendment as an amendment, that it needs to be
- 22 amended to say they will adopt their own procedures or,
- 23 you know, standing rules like you said.
- MS. LIVINGSTON: Well, some of the
- 25 things I've heard too, you know, like the putting things

1 on the agenda. And some of them saying, "Well, I was not

- 2 notified before time that this was going to be on the
- 3 agenda."
- And there should be something, you know,
- 5 spelled out clearly about that. Because you don't want
- 6 to just walk into Council and be faced with a problem
- 7 that you haven't been told about or have not talked about
- 8 or something like this.
- 9 And so, you know, these matters should be kind
- 10 of spelled out as to notification. Also, you know, how
- 11 far in advance it should be set up. And those Council
- 12 people should be prepared and ready at the time this
- 13 Council meeting is taking place, to go in there and sit
- 14 down and do business.
- MR. KEEN: Ma'am, let me ask you
- 16 another question. I can't put my finger on the
- 17 Constitutional language right now, but I know there's
- 18 been some concern in the past with what you just stated
- 19 and having proper notice of agenda items and proper times
- 20 for Councilors to consider whatever is being proposed.
- 21 Do you feel that the Executive of the
- 22 government should be compelled to comply with those same
- 23 notice requirements if the Executive wish to present
- 24 something to the Council?
- 25 MS. LIVINGSTON: Well, everyone that

- 1 is involved in this should have.
- 2 Another thing too. I don't think we would
- 3 have been in the situation that we are now if there was
- 4 something that was compelled for these people when they
- 5 make the reports, make the reports on time because the
- 6 Council cannot operate when they don't have that
- 7 information.
- And just because they don't want to vote on
- 9 it, they don't want to be at meetings, they don't want to
- 10 put that money out unless they know for sure that money
- 11 is in there. And if they don't have proper reports on
- 12 time, they can't do their job. And something should be
- 13 done about this.
- 14 It should be entered into the Constitution or
- 15 into the standing rules that your report will be at the
- 16 meetings or at the Council meeting. Because you can't
- 17 expect our Council people to do their job if the other
- 18 people are falling down on their job and not bringing the
- 19 reports in on time. Because they're the ones that vote
- 20 on how that money is spent, and they have to know where
- 21 it's being spent.
- 22 And if they don't have those reports, they
- 23 can't act on it. They can't be expected to. I think
- 24 that should enter in there somewhere in your finance
- 25 thing in the standing rules or something. Because people

1 should be made to be responsible and accountable. And

- 2 this is what this Constitution and the standing rules is
- 3 supposed to do, is to make them responsible and
- 4 accountable for their jobs.
- 5 MR. WICKLIFFE: You're possibly
- 6 referring to presenting a financial statement, showing
- 7 the condition of each account.
- 8 MS. LIVINGSTON: Yes. Uh-huh. And I
- 9 don't know where that is in the Constitution, but that
- 10 should be --
- 11 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Article 10.
- MS. LIVINGSTON: But we truly need
- 13 something that would hold them --
- MR. WICKLIFFE: We don't know how
- 15 that would come in or why. The financial statement, it's
- 16 complete.
- 17 MS. LIVINGSTON: I think in the
- 18 Constitution, it doesn't really state that, does it?
- MR. HANNAH: Well, in Article 10
- 20 under "Fiscal Responsibilities --"
- 21 MS. LIVINGSTON: That's just for the
- 22 Treasurer, isn't it?
- MR. HANNAH: It actually makes the
- 24 statement in Section 3, "At least thirty days prior to
- 25 the convening of each regular session of the Council the

1 Secretary/Treasurer, shall make and present to the

- 2 Council an itemized estimate of the revenue to be
- 3 received by the Cherokee Nation together with a statement
- 4 of sources from which revenues are to be received under
- 5 the laws, the grants, judgments, interests, and any of
- 6 the sources as effected at the time of such estimate is
- 7 made for the next ensuing fiscal year."
- 8 And continues on with the additional
- 9 activities, as well as consolidated balance sheet,
- 10 conforming with general accepted accounting principles
- 11 within sixty days of the ending fiscal year. So there
- 12 are standing requirements.
- MS. LIVINGSTON: And if they don't
- 14 follow them, I think we should put something in there to
- 15 make sure that they do. Maybe just not consider their
- 16 wishes. Because they come in there asking for money and
- 17 they say, "Well, give us a sheet telling us what you did
- 18 with the money we've already given you." And they said,
- 19 "Well, we'll get it in there to you." By the next time,
- 20 the next meeting, they're still asking for it.
- 21 So there should be some stipulation in the
- 22 standing rules or somewhere where these people, if they
- 23 don't bring those in, well, then they shouldn't be able
- 24 to get any money.
- 25 Because that's been a problem, is the money

- 1 being spent out and then nobody bringing in the
- 2 statements at the time that they're needed. And then
- 3 they come back asking for more. And they haven't even
- 4 presented their statement from the last time.
- 5 MR. KEEN: Ma'am, Section 8 of
- 6 Article 10 also states --
- 7 MS. LIVINGSTON: Well, this paper
- 8 here, Section 8 -- the way it's put together here --
- 9 MR. HANNAH: This is Article 10,
- 10 which is the fiscal section and Section 8. Mr. Keen.
- 11 MR. KEEN: I was just going to point
- 12 out that Section 8 states that: "All laws authorizing
- 13 the expenditure of the money by and behalf of the
- 14 Cherokee Nation shall specify the purpose for which the
- 15 money is to be used and be so designated shall be used
- 16 for no other purpose. And any expenditure shall not
- 17 exceed the available funds."
- 18 So is the concern you're telling us today,
- 19 that it's tied in with this, with the Council's ability
- 20 to make proper expenditures?
- 21 MS. LIVINGSTON: Well, the thing of
- 22 it is, some of those finance meetings that I've been to,
- 23 they have taken funds out of other accounts and given to
- 24 them, and then they come back wanting more money and they
- 25 haven't brought in their receipts saying what they spent

- 1 the previous money for.
- 2 And the Council don't want to be dipping into
- 3 those funds and taking them out whenever it's illegal.
- 4 And one person even said, "Well, they can throw me in
- 5 jail for doing this."
- 6 Because those funds are allocated for certain
- 7 things. When they vote for that money to go to someone
- 8 else, they're just loaning it to them. And then they
- 9 come back wanting more. Something should be done about
- 10 that.
- I mean, something should be put into the
- 12 Constitution or into standing rules that if they come
- 13 back wanting more money, they've got to have their papers
- 14 in order at that time for their expenditures. And the
- 15 Council had asked for that. And they said, "Well, we
- 16 just don't have it right now, but we'll get it for you."
- 17 And they said, "Well, no, we're not going to give you any
- 18 money until you show us."
- 19 And then they tried to run it through the
- 20 Council meeting after it not being taken up in the
- 21 Committee. So, see, you know, this isn't right. It
- 22 shouldn't have even been put on the agenda for the
- 23 Council meeting. It should have been ironed out in that
- 24 Committee.
- MR. HANNAH: Would there be any other

questions from Commissioners for clarification for the
point that Ms. Livingston has raised for us today?
MS. LIVINGSTON: And something should
go in there to rectify this, you know. And that's what
I'm saying, it's not that the Council don't want to help
them, but they're limited and they're hands are tied on
what they can do.
MR. HANNAH: Ma'am, we're very
appreciative for your comments before the Commission.
Thank you for appearing here today for that to be entered
into the official record.

VIRGINIA	

- MS. STROUD: My name is Virginia
- 3 Stroud. S-T-R-O-U-D.
- 4 And I wish to ask that an Attorney General
- 5 position be established to carry out and to oversee the
- 6 laws and enforce the laws separate from the Judicial and
- 7 the Legislative branch.
- MR. KEEN: Ma'am, before you step
- 9 down, let me ask, if the Constitution creates this
- 10 office, do you feel that it should be by appointment or
- 11 by popular vote of the people?
- MS. STROUD: I think it would be
- 13 popular vote, don't you think? And then I want to know
- 14 if we have in our provisions here in the Constitution
- 15 conflicts of interest within the Tribal Council. Do you
- 16 understand what I'm talking about?
- 17 That we have people on Council that have
- 18 leases, that have been leased to the Tribe and no use for
- 19 their land. Do you understand what I'm trying to get to?
- 20 We all know what is happening.
- 21 But how can -- and then, I'd like to see a
- 22 provision in the Constitution or in the statements; if
- 23 the Council members are not at meetings, they do not get
- 24 paid for not attending the meetings. Do you know that
- 25 they're getting paid now?

1 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Or maybe that you

- 2 miss five meetings in a year, you're off. There's rules.
- 3 And it's so open right now. And I'm not that familiar,
- 4 but that's the question I pose.
- 5 MR. THOMAS: You mean if they don't
- 6 go to the Council meetings that they should be impeached
- 7 or not get paid?
- 8 MS. STROUD: I don't see how they can
- 9 be impeached. According to this, they can't be
- 10 impeached, but they can get paid for not going.
- 11 MR. THOMAS: The people that elected
- 12 them for their individual accountings should call them in
- 13 and have a meeting. And I don't know if they can even do
- 14 it like you say. But those are the people that should
- 15 impeach or get rid of them. They're the ones that
- 16 elected that person. The general public did not elect my
- 17 Councilman, William Smoke.
- MS. STROUD: Right. Just your
- 19 district.
- 20 MR. THOMAS: Right. Just Mayes
- 21 County. And if we want to get rid of them, then it's up
- 22 to us to get rid of them. It's like the State
- 23 Legislature. If you have a person that's serving in
- 24 Oklahoma City and you're happy with them, and the
- 25 Governor is not, and the Governor could come in and wipe

- 1 him out, that wouldn't be right.
- The people who put you up there are the ones,
- 3 I feel, that should get rid of you if you aren't
- 4 performing up to their expectations.
- 5 MS. STROUD: Well, we know why
- 6 they're not attending. But they're still getting paid.
- 7 MR. THOMAS: Yes.
- 8 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Well, the State
- 9 Legislature, don't they get paid too?
- 10 MR. HANNAH: Please, the gentlewoman
- 11 deserves to be heard. I bring that up, not as a point of
- 12 quashing our discussion, but simply pointing out that our
- 13 court reporter, since it's not a part of our official
- 14 record, it is very difficult for her to take down all of
- 15 these conversations.
- Ma'am, I do not wish you to withdraw, but
- 17 simply --
- 18 MS. STROUD: Well, those were the
- 19 questions that I would like to have the answer to, I
- 20 guess. Or looked into the answer as to how the Council
- 21 could continue to conduct business at the general Council
- 22 meetings in an orderly way.
- I think that's all I have.
