Dear Cherokee Nation Citizen,



Many of you have asked for financial information and highlights of the Cherokee Nation in a format that is easy to read and understand. In this report, you will find financial and statistical information about the Cherokee Nation and its service departments and programs, specifically those serving our mission to the Cherokee people: "Homes, Health and Hope."

The information in this report summarizes the Cherokee Nation's financial position based on the detailed financial statements found within our Fiscal Year 2017 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). The financial statements were prepared in conformance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and audited by an independent accounting firm. The balances presented in this report are for the general government and are presented in an unaudited, non-GAAP format. Cherokee Nation's subsidiary component units contact and general information can be found on page 14; however, their financial information is not included in this report.





Capital Projects in FY2017



Cherokee Nation Health Services, the largest tribal health system in the US, was awarded an Indian Health Service (IHS) Joint Venture Construction project to build a 469,000-square-foot outpatient facility in Tahlequah. As construction began in FY2017, we invested \$37.9m into the construction project. Once completed, IHS will provide at least \$80m annually for staffing and operations of the new facility.



Focusing on providing quality care for Cherokees, we invested \$8.1m in FY2017 to renovate and expand our tribal complex facility so that our citizens can have better and easier access to services. The Judicial Branch will relocate to the complex, which will then house all three branches of our tribal government.





Health and wellness are top priorities for Cherokee Nation. We have set the standard in Indian Country for outstanding health care. The Cherokee Nation's health care capital improvement plan demonstrates our dedication to creating a world-class health care system and making health care more accessible.



Behavioral Health Programs

These programs aid in mental health, substance abuse and community-based programs promoting mental health. We assisted 18,814 patients in FY2017.

Emergency Medical Services

Cherokee Nation Emergency Medical Services (CNEMS) is a state-licensed paramedic level ambulance service. *In FY2017, CNEMS responded to 5,537 calls*.

Cancer Programs

Offers early detection education and screenings as part a comprehensive cancer control plan. *In FY2017*, there were 2,679 patients screened by preventative cancer programs.

Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

Directed toward pregnant or nursing women, as well as infants and children less than five years of age, to assist with acquiring healthy foods. *In FY2017*, *WIC served 82,814 participants*.


Patient visits in FY2017





Unrestricted Contributions to Public Schools

Each year the Cherokee Nation allocates 38% of its tax revenue from the sale of tribal car tags to public schools in the tribal reservation's 14 counties. In 2017, \$4.8m was distributed to 105 public school districts.





Through educational programs, higher education scholarships and schools serving pre-K through 12th grade, Cherokee Nation empowers our tribal citizens by offering them resources to create a better future for themselves and their families.

Preservation of the Cherokee language is a priority, and we work to ensure its continuance through creation of unique and diverse programs to teach and promote our language.



Higher Education

The College Resource program awards scholarships to eligible Cherokee Nation tribal citizens pursuing a degree at an accredited college. *In FY2017*, there were 4,854 undergraduate and graduate scholarships awarded.

Head Start

Head Start is based on the premise that children six weeks to five years old from income eligible families can benefit from a social and educational program. *In FY2017*, there were 880 students enrolled in Head Start.

Sequoyah High School

Sequoyah offers high school education for Native American students in grades 9th-12th. *In FY2017, there were 388 students enrolled at Sequoyah*.

Cherokee Language Immersion School

A language preservation program designed to revitalize the Cherokee language beginning with our children in grades preK - 8th. *In FY2017*, there were 130 children enrolled at the Immersion School.

The Cherokee Nation offers an array of family support programs, some of which are designed specifically for children and elders.



Family Assistance

Family Assistance encourages individuals to achieve their highest level of potential by promoting economic and social stability. Assisted 3,314 people with their utility payments and food distribution centers served over 135.000 individuals in FY2017.

Child Care & Development Center (CDC)


Cherokee Nation cares deeply about the development and well-being of its youngest citizens, by providing quality child development and child care services. *Our CDC centers enrolled 426 children in FY2017*.

Children, Youth & Family Services

This department is a fully integrated support system for children and families who need stability and consistency in times of crisis or uncertainty. *In the Indian Child Welfare program*, over 1,700 children are cared for monthly in our foster care system.

Elder Care


Cherokee Nation respects its elders and performs necessary advocacy for our elderly Cherokee citizens who are unable to do so themselves. In FY2017, we provided 38,544 hot meals to elders at our senior nutrition sites.





Cherokee Nation Job Fairs Conducted

Cherokee Nation partners with businesses to hire qualified Cherokee Nation citizens. These partnerships help bring outside businesses to Oklahoma as well as strengthen our local economies. In FY2017, there were 35 job fairs conducted.





Cherokee Nation is committed to growing our local and regional economies through programs that assist with job creation, career training and entrepreneurial assistance.

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Vocational Training

Cherokee Nation offers several in-house training programs as well as assistance to those who are enrolled in vocational training or Associate of Applied Arts or Applied Science degree programs. *In FY2017, there were 1,473 Native American participants*.

Adult Education

Students study at their own pace and receive individualized and group instruction. In FY2017, there were 239 citizens that received their G.E.D. from this program.

Self-Sufficiency Programs

Assists participants to create financial security through educational classes and financial coaching. *In FY2017*, there were 70 families that successfully obtained mortgages for homes.

Small Business Assistance Center (SBAC)

SBAC encourages entrepreneurship through business financing, government contracting and development services for Cherokee citizens. We made \$2.7 million in commercial loans in FY2017 to 49 small businesses which resulted in the creation or retention of 178 jobs.

Cherokee communities are known for their strength and resilience. Cherokee Nation contributes resources to our communities to ensure they remain strong and prosperous.

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Transit

Provides people throughout the Cherokee Nation reservation a safe, efficient and cost-effective way to travel between our communities. *In FY2017, there were 102,148 transit rides provided.*

Roads

The mission of the Roads Program is to improve the quality of life for Native American families and communities by providing safe roads and better access to housing, schools, healthcare and jobs. *In FY2017*, there were 78.19 miles of roads and bridges that were constructed or repaired.

Backpack Program

Provides students with school supplies and nutritional weekend snacks. *In* 2017, \$75,200 was given to 20 backpack organizations helping 2,458 students.


The Cherokee Nation believes in investing in our communities. *In FY2017*, *Cherokee Nation provided over \$8.0m of unrestricted contributions to schools, communities, nonprofits and local organizations.*

Engineering & Sanitation

Assists qualified applicants with sanitation facilities for new, like-new or existing homes. *Engineering & Sanitation participated in 906 projects in FY2017*.

Environmental Health

Ensures that Cherokee Nation facilities are operated in a safe and sanitary manner. *This office assisted with 347 reviews of compliance*.

Environmental Programs (CNEP)

Our various resources address the Cherokee Nation's environmental concerns. In FY2017, CNEP conducted 873 environmental reviews for projects involving roadway development, water and sewer infrastructure, housing rehabilitation and new construction.

Tribal Historic Preservation

Collaborates with public and private sectors to ensure that Cherokee cultural resources are protected and preserved. *In FY2017, this program conducted* over 4,000 proposed project reviews under the Federal Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

Seed Bank

The program maintains an inventory of rare heirloom Cherokee crops and native plants traditionally used by Cherokees for food and cultural purposes. *In FY2017, we distributed 3,784 packages of seeds to tribal citizens.*
