EDUCATION

About Education:

The Cherokee Nation Education Services continues to fulfill its purpose of cultivating the development of skilled and knowledgeable Cherokees through operations of programs that focus resources on serving people of all ages, from early childhood to adulthood. Tribal citizens can benefit from services provided by these programs, both within and outside the Oklahoma public school system.

Head Start - Early Childhood Unit

The mission of the Early Childhood Unit is to bring about a greater degree of social competence in children who may be disadvantaged. The ECU's approach is based on the philosophy that a child can benefit most from a comprehensive, interdisciplinary program to foster development and remedy problems through the involvement of the child's entire family as well as community.

Cherokee Nation Early Childhood Unit offers two options: Head Start, a classroom environment promoting early childhood development stages; and Early Head Start, serving children aged 6 weeks to 3 years old.

HEALTH

About Health Programs:

The Cherokee Nation operates a network of 8 health centers and one hospital throughout the Cherokee Nation. Other programs offered include EMS, Diabetes, Community Health, Cancer, Behavioral Health, the Jack Brown Center for youth and Cherokee Elder Care.

Behavioral Health Services

Offers a variety of services and programs. These include mental health and substance abuse services, community prevention, research, and evaluation. Outpatient services include individual and group therapy, grief and trauma counseling, substance abuse counseling, relapse prevention, parenting skills, psychiatry, psychological testing, and crisis intervention.

All health centers provide Adult Behavioral Health Services. Child and Adolescent services are currently offered in Tahlequah, Muskogee, Jay, and Nowata and are provided by the HERO project. Availability varies by location.

Hero Project

The HERO Project is an outpatient service of the Children's Behavioral Health unit. Our goal is to support our children, youth, families, and communities. We provide counseling and support services for families with children from newborn to 21 years of age who are citizens of a federally recognized tribe.

Therapeutic Services - Group, Family, Individual

Family Care Management

- Help find community resources (child care, parenting classes, social services, etc.)

Support for Parents and Caregivers

Circle of Security Parenting Program is an evidence based program for parents and caregivers of children birth to 6 years of age. Participants of this course meet once a week for 9 weeks, each session lasting 90 minutes.

- Understand your child's emotional world by learning to read the emotional
- Support your child's ability to successfully manage emotions
- Enhance the development of your child's self esteem
- Honor your innate wisdom and desire for your child to be secure

Cherokee Nation Cancer Programs

The CNBCCP offers clinical breast exams, screening mammography, diagnostic mammography, biopsies, breast ultrasound, diagnostic follow-up, Pap smear test, colposcopy, LEEP (a diagnostic procedure), community outreach and case management. Eligibility: Services available to women ages 40-64 who are uninsured and are at or below 250 percent federal poverty level.

Cancer Programs Cancer Registry

Cherokee Nation is the only tribe in the U.S with a cancer registry. The Registry was funded initially in 1997 by the National Cancer Institute's Surveillance, Epidemiology and End Results (SEER) program. Among some of the information the registry collects are: type of cancer, stage of disease at the time of diagnosis (how far the cancer has advanced), and how and when cancer is diagnosed and treated.

Woman Infants and Children (WIC)

WIC is a federally-funded health and nutrition program for women, infants and children. The program is directed toward pregnant or nursing women, as well as infants and children less than five years of age.

WIC also provides nutrition education, breastfeeding support and referrals for healthcare and other community services. Participants must meet income guidelines. WIC serves women who are pregnant, postpartum, or breastfeeding; infants, and children under the age of 5. Within the Cherokee Nation WIC clinics are located inside the 14 county reservation providing services to more than 7,300 women, infants, and children each month. HOUSING AUTHORITY

About the Housing Authority:

The Housing Authority of the Cherokee Nation was created in 1966 to provide decent, safe, and sanitary housing within the Cherokee Nation. Today, nearly fifty years later, we continue that original mission and are dedicated to providing housing assistance through a number of programs. Nearly 6,000 families are assisted with housing through the HACN on a number of programs. As a sub-recipient of NAHASDA funding for the Cherokee Nation we administer low-income rental housing, rental assistance, college housing, and manage a number of homes previously constructed with federal housing funds.

Today, the HACN has renewed its commitment to providing new construction opportunities to Cherokee families. Through an innovative approach we offer a New Home Construction Program. This program uses funding outside of federal grant programs to provide housing. Preference is given to families that own their own land or has a family member that is willing to donate land for construction.

Child Care and Development Programs

Offers a variety of different services for parents seeking child care and developmental resource services.

Child Care Subsidy

Cherokee Nation Child Care Subsidy helps parents pay for the cost of child care. There are 5 subsidy offices located in Tahlequah, Catoosa, Pryor, Stilwell and Sallisaw and 2 document drop off locations in Jay and Ochelata.

To be eligible, parents/guardians must meet the following guidelines:

- Be working, going to school, in need of protective services, and /or actively
 participating in a structured job search for the purpose of obtaining
 employment
- Meet income guidelines
- Have proof of citizenship in a federally recognized tribe
- Live within the Cherokee Nation 14-county service area
- Children must be age 12 and under, children with special needs may qualify for services up to age 19
- Use a Cherokee Nation licensed contracted provider or a relative provider that
 has been approved by Cherokee Nation Child Care Licensing, providers must
 be located within the 14-county CN service area

Documents needed to apply for child care subsidy:

- Proof of citizenship in a federally recognized tribe
- Birth certificate
 Proof of residence
- Income verification
- School schedule (if applicable)
- Custody (if applicable)
- Client Information Form
- Client Responsibility Form
- Employment Verification Form

How to apply for subsidy:

Parents/guardians may apply for subsidy in person, by email or fax. If the parent/guardian subsidy application is approved, certification lasts up to 12 months. To apply by email, call the child care office for caseworker contact information.

Child Care Licensing

Relative Child Care Provider Information:

Cherokee Nation subsidy allows use of relative providers. Registered Exempt (Relative) Providers are the grandparents, great grandparents, aunts, uncles, or adult sibling not living in the home of the child. The relationship can be by blood or marriage. Relative Providers are exempt from DHS licensing, but must meet tribal Health and Safety Standards of Operation and Quality of Service. Periodic monitoring visits are made. For

Cherokee Connections

Cherokee Connections focuses services on relatives who are caring for children while their parents work or go to school. The program strives to improve the quality of child care for children who are cared for in relatives' homes, through a variety of learning opportunities for the relative caregivers and the children in their care. Program components include a year-long home visiting program.

Training/Technical Assistance/Resource Lending Library

Child Care Resource Center offers training, technical assistance, quarterly newsletters and a resource and lending library to child care providers and provides community outreach.

<u>Cherokee PARENTS (Positive and Rewarding Educational, Nurturing Tribal Services)</u>

Cherokee PARENTS is a 20 week, in-home, parent support program offered to Native American Families in the 14-county service area. Participants in the Cherokee PARENTS program will receive a weekly visit from a parent educator that will last approximately one hour. These weekly visits are scheduled at the convenience of the parent or caregiver. Cherokee PARENTS uses a curriculum called SafeCare, which includes home safety, health and Parent-Child (PCI) or Parent-Infant Interaction (PII). Each module lasts approximately 6 weeks, not including intake and discharge. Participants will gain valuable knowledge, earn monetary incentives, and receive invaluable tools and resources.

To be eligible, parent must:

- Live in the 14 county service area
- Have a child 0-5 years of age
- Does not have an active DHS or ICW case
- Child or Parent must be Native American

General Assistance

This program is a financial assistance service for tribal citizens to address essential living needs. Assistance is based on welfare payment standards and is considered a secondary resource to the Department of Human Services TANF program and Social Security SSI program.

Families who are eligible for TANF and SSI are required by federal regulations to apply and comply with their guidelines and requirements.

Family Assistance also offers Burial assistance and LIHEAP services to eligible households. Please contact Family Assistance for more information

When families are not eligible for the General Assistance program or any other program within Family Assistance, then they are referred to other agencies. Referrals may be made to other agencies by sending a referral form to the other agency on behalf of the family. *NOTE: You cannot receive General Assistance from Cherokee Nation if you are receiving assistance from another tribe. Tribal Emergency Assistance

The program was designed and approved by the tribal council to assist families in the time of imminent need. Imminent need is defined as basic needs of an individual or family that if not addressed immediately within 24-48 hours or less may result in hunger, loss of shelter, medical peril, job loss or family breakdown.

Emergency Housing Assistance

The program's primary focus is keeping families safe and in secure housing. Assistance is always made to the landlord or mortgage facility and in some cases utility companies. This assistance is a onetime payment to the vendor and payment is based on the family's need and their ability to remain self-sufficient. The family's income cannot exceed the current HUD income guidelines and the family must have sufficient income to maintain their housing. A family can only receive service in this category once in a three year period of time.

PRIORITY IS GIVEN TO ASSIST THOSE THAT ARE:

- Currently living in shelters
- ➤ Homeless families or individuals living on the streets or in cars
- Recent disasters such as burnouts, total loss of a home due to flood, fire or tornado.
- Elderly persons
- Cherokee Nation Indian Child Welfare cases
- Families residing in over-crowded conditions
- Families living in Cherokee Nation or state-subsidized housing and are at risk of becoming homeless.

School Clothing Voucher Program

The Cherokee Nation Clothing Voucher Program is funded through the Tribal Council. The overall goal of this program is to assist families with back to school expenses by providing financial assistance for school clothes for those attending public or private school. Applications are usually taken during the summer months. Eligibility Requirements:

- Open to students enrolled in Kindergarten through 12th grade in a public/private school or a Cherokee Nation operated school.
- Student must be 5 years old by September 1.
- Must reside within the Cherokee Nation Tribal reservation.
- Must be a Cherokee Nation tribal citizen at time of application.
- Must meet income eligibility guidelines.

Food Distribution

The Cherokee Nation Food Distribution Program is dedicated to distributing nutritious foods to eligible tribal member households residing within the reservation boundaries of the Cherokee Nation and fall within USDA regulations. The amount of food a household is eligible to receive is determined by the number of household members that are certified to be income eligible for services. There are six actual food distribution stores throughout the fourteen county Cherokee Nation boundaries.

Child Support Services

Child Support Services is more than just the money - it's about strengthening Cherokee relationships and families.

This is a free program which can assist you by providing DNA testing to establish paternity, completing services to establish a child support order; providing general location services, completing modifications of child support orders and monitoring and administering enforcement tools to ensure adherence to child support orders. The goal of the program is to establish, monitor and enforce child support orders so that there is regular consistent child support as that is ultimately in the best interest of the child.

Eligibility Requirements:

- A child under the age of majority, and whom is currently residing within the tribe's reservation service area.
- A child under the age of majority is defined as a person under the age of eighteen (18) years old or a person under the age of twenty (20) years old who has not graduated from high school and is regularly attending public or private school to complete their high school education.
- Child Support Services can also assist tribal citizens outside of the Cherokee Nation reservation service area, with limited enforcement activities.

INDIAN CHILD WELFARE

About Indian Child Welfare:

The division of Indian Child Welfare offers an array of protective services for children and families. The program will accept, investigate and record all reports of alleged abuse and neglect of children and provides protection to children directly on tribal trust land. Child Protective Services also works with the Department of Human Services to investigate the abuse or mistreatment of children residing outside the Cherokee Nation. The primary responsibility of Child Protective Services is to assess the safety of the child and take the appropriate action to protect and promote the best interest of the child.

What is child abuse?

Child abuse is defined by law as harm or threatened to harm a child's health and welfare through acts or neglect by the child's parent(s), legal guardian or caretaker.

- Physical Abuse: non-accidental physical injury to a child under the age of 18.
- Physical Neglect: failure to provide a child under the age of 18 with basic needs such as food, clothing, shelter, medical care, educational opportunity, protection or supervision.
- Sexual Abuse: sexual exploitation of a child or adolescent for the gratification of the perpetrator or another person.
- Psychological Maltreatment: rejecting, terrorizing, isolating, exploiting, corrupting, and/or denying emotional responsiveness.

Who is required to report child abuse?

EVERY PERSON, whether citizen or professional, with reasonable cause to believe that a child under 18 is being abused or is in danger of being abused, is required to report the suspicion of abuse by federal, tribal and state law.

When should someone report child abuse?

A report should be made when there is reasonable cause to believe that a child or adolescent has been abused or neglected or is in danger of being abused.

How should an abuse report be made? A report can be made to any county office of the Department of Human Services. Child abuse can also be reported 24 hours per day, seven days per week by calling the statewide child abuse hotline.

You can also contact Cherokee Nation Indian Child Welfare Intake at 918-458-6900. What information is needed when reporting abuse?

- Name of the child and family members
 - Approximate age of the child (required) and family members gender of the child and family members
 - Family address or directions to the child's home or current location (required)
 - Family phone number
 - Parents place of employment
 - Description of suspected abuse (required)
 - Current condition of the child (required)

Those reporting child abuse can remain anonymous.

Becoming a Placement Resource Home

Cherokee Nation welcomes a variety of Indian families from all over the U.S who are willing to be a resource for our Cherokee children & other Native American children. Cherokee Nation ICW actively recruits families from ALL federally recognized tribes.

A family willing to open their home to child(ren) in need of temporary or permanent care may apply to become a certified "Placement Resource home" with Cherokee Nation.

Foster Care and Adoptive Home Certifications

Cherokee Nation Indian Child Welfare accepts inquiries for families who want to become a certified foster or adoptive home for children who may be involved in the Court systems throughout the United States. The criteria includes being able to love, respect, nurture, protect and parent a child, being at least 21 years of age, a member of a federally recognized tribe, in good health, and able to provide adequately for a child's day to day needs. Cherokee Nation Angel Project

TRIBAL REGISTRATION

To be eligible for a Tribal Citizenship with the Cherokee Nation, you must be able to provide documents that connect you to an enrolled lineal ancestor, who is listed on the Dawes Rolls: These Rolls were taken between 1899-1906 of Citizens and Freedmen residing in Indian Territory (now NE Oklahoma).

Tribal Citizenship is issued through the biological parents. In adoption cases tribal citizenship must be proven through the natural parent to the enrolled ancestor. A copy of the Final Decree of Adoption (will list the Natural Indian parent) and an amended State Certified Birth Record (will list the adopting parents) must accompany the application. All information will remain confidential.
